FROM THE PASTOR

It's not a story. It's not poetry either. I'm not sure it is metaphor. More than any of these it is praise – almost line after line, phrase after phrase put together in inordinately long sentences. And thus, it is a labor to read them.

I'm talking about the book of Ephesians, especially the first three chapters, which is half the epistle. It's not an epistle that tells the story of ancient Ephesus. It is a collection of praises praising the glamourous work of God in Christ.

It's like listening to someone tell you about their ingenious grandchild who they believe to be a prodigy of some kind. They just can't quite put their finger on it, but they are sure the child will be world renown someday. Ephesians is filled with words like ingenious, prodigy and renown – words meant to enlarge and extrapolate with hyperbole.

Thus Ephesians is not easily read. But it makes for some great refrigerator postings -

"Blessed be the God and Father or our Lord Jesus Christ!"

"Blessed in Christ with every Spiritual Blessing!"

"Praise the glorious grace God freely bestowed on us in the Beloved!"

"In Christ we have redemption, forgiveness and grace lavished upon us!"

And those are all in just the first few verses of chapter one. And by the time you add an exclamation mark to each of the phrases you are exhausted with the drama. But that is Ephesians. It consistently engages exaggerated images of the glamorous, magnanimous work of God in Christ. Who knew it was so glamorous! And who can proclaim it with so much drama! I find myself lost in the glam! It is so over the top.

Were I listening to anyone other than the Spirit I would say, "Ok. Ok. Get over yourself!"

But I dare not say such a thing to the Spirit, in which the writer of the epistle is so overwhelmed. I try to listen. I try to stay focused.

And finally, with the help of my friend Eugene Peterson, I am caught up myself in the certainty of the epistle writer. God has been active "in Christ" doing a work of grace that is beyond any glamour we might ever imagine. Apart from the writer himself, or anyone else; before the beginning of time and at the beginning of time, until now God has been present and at work "in Christ" for the sake of all people. God has "broken down the dividing wall(s) (2:14)" that so easily separate people and too easily remain for centuries. God in Christ overwhelms the upstairs downstairs divisions to reconcile people to live together in the love of God for all people.

Such walls are alien to the heart of God. People experience the inclusive heart of God in Christ. For Paul, it was about his calling to the Gentile people. For others like us it is a host of dividing walls God is working in Christ to destroy.

And the greater truth is, often unbeknownst to us God is working in Christ to do these things. Easter proclaims God is resurrected in Christ doing God's work of raising people up into being a body of Christ that will be God's dwelling place forever and ever (2:22).

It is easy to turn a blind eye to such. Because such is so often intangible, pragmatists like us don't see the glam the epistle believes is always present in the work of God in Christ. But Ephesians dares me to believe such work of grace is present! Thus, support it, proclaim it, embody it, celebrate it, etc.

FAIREST LORD JESUS: A HYMN OF BEAUTY AND DEVOTION

As a minister of music, I have the privilege of leading congregations in worship through song. Among the many hymns that have stood the test of time, *Fairest Lord Jesus* holds a special place in the hearts of believers. Its lyrical beauty, rich melody, and deep theological significance make it a cherished piece in Christian hymnody.

The origins of *Fairest Lord Jesus* are somewhat shrouded in mystery. Some traditions suggest that the hymn was written by German Jesuits in the 17th century, while others trace its roots to the Crusaders of the 12th century. The hymn was later translated into English by Joseph A. Seiss in the 19th century, and the melody we sing today is most commonly associated with the tune *Crusader's Hymn* or *Schönster Herr Jesu*.

One of the reasons *Fairest Lord Jesus* resonates so deeply with worshippers is its poetic depiction of Christ's beauty, both in creation and in His divine nature. The hymn opens with:

Fairest Lord Jesus, Ruler of all nature, O Thou of God and man the Son, Thee will I cherish, Thee will I honor, Thou, my soul's glory, joy, and crown.

These words express both admiration for the beauty of Christ and a personal commitment to cherish and honor Him. The hymn continues to compare Christ to nature's finest displays—the meadows, the woodlands, and the shining heavenly bodies—yet proclaims that Jesus is fairer, purer, and surpassingly glorious. Beyond its poetic beauty, the hymn is an invitation to deep worship. It calls us to lift our eyes beyond the grandeur of creation and fix our hearts on the Lord Himself. While creation reflects God's handiwork, the hymn reminds us that Jesus is the source of all beauty and the greatest object of our devotion.

Generations of believers have found comfort and inspiration in *Fairest Lord Jesus*. Whether sung in a traditional choral arrangement, a simple acoustic setting, or even a contemporary interpretation, its message remains timeless. As a minister of music, I find that this hymn helps congregations engage in heartfelt worship, drawing them into awe and reverence before Christ.

Fairest Lord Jesus is more than just a hymn—it is a testimony of Christ's supremacy and beauty. As we sing these words the first Sunday in April, may our hearts be drawn closer to the One who is truly fairest, our Savior and King. May we never cease to cherish and honor Him, for He alone is worthy of our highest praise. *Dylan*


