#### FROM THE PASTOR

As I prepare and look forward to Easter, April 20, I do so with an array of thoughts and feelings. As a preacher, I cannot escape the foolish, ministerial expectations that come with that day. My imagination runs wild as I feel it's up to me to resurrect the masses that attend worship that day! The music, the worship, the preaching has to be outstanding! Right?!

Thus, I relish the ancient practice of Lent to best prepare myself with a steady dose of humility and reality, and what I call earthiness. Karen Marsh helped me along the way as I began my Lent, reading her Ash Wednesday devotion for

Karen leads *Theological Horizons*, a ministry to students and the community of the University of Virginia. Her book, *Wake Up to Wonder* led her to offer the following reflection as we approach Lent to prepare ourselves for Easter:

God formed Man out of dirt from the ground and blew into his nostrils the breath of life. The Man came alive—a living soul!" (Genesis 2:7, The Message)

Scientists tell us that 97% of our bodies - primarily oxygen, carbon, hydrogen, nitrogen, calcium and phosphorus - are the very same elements that compose *dirt*. This fact should not shock, for each Ash Wednesday (in 2025 it was March 5) we are called to remember the words of the Bible: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return (Genesis 3:19)." ... Our physical beings are, quite literally, that of humus. How humbling.

True humility brings a kind of relief to those of us who labor to be more, do more, prove more. But humility is no weakness. Out of the 16th century, Teresa of Avila reassures us that "humility is the truth. To be humble is to walk in truth, to recognize what we are in the sight of God, and to know that our worth depends on God's mercy."

Mother Teresa puts it plainly. "If you are humble, nothing will touch you, neither praise nor disgrace, because you know what you are." Dust.

As we step into Lent may we wake up to the wonder of this truth: we are made from the earth. And we are, in God's hands, created to bear abundant fruit.

Wendell Berry says, "The soil is the great connector of lives, the source and destination of all. It is the healer and restorer and resurrector."

Take a few minutes to go outside. Leave behind your phone but take along a spade, a shovel or even a spoon. Bring a magnifying glass if you have one.

Find a patch of soil and dig up a healthy clump. Now settle in and look very closely at the dirt, as if seeing dirt for the very first time. Touch it. Smell it. Examine the soil for the presence of minerals, organic matter, water, even living organisms.

As you hold the dirt in your hands, taking abundant time, prayerfully meditate upon the words of St. Augustine "You are dust, and to dust you shall return. Be humble, for you are made of earth. Be noble, for you are made for God."

## I'D RATHER HAVE JESUS: A SONG OF DEVOTION AND SURRENDER

Throughout the history of the Church, music has been a powerful tool in drawing hearts closer to God. Certain hymns have stood the test of time, continuing to inspire believers with their profound lyrics and deep spiritual truths. One such hymn is *I'd Rather Have Jesus*—a song that echoes the cry of a heart fully devoted to Christ.

The words to *I'd Rather Have Jesus* were originally a poem written by Rhea F. Miller in 1922. However, it was the gifted musician George Beverly Shea who set the poem to music, turning it into the beloved hymn we know today. The story goes that Shea's mother left the poem on the family piano, and as he read the words, he was moved to compose a melody that would bring them to life. This hymn would later become a staple in Shea's ministry, especially through his work with the Billy Graham Crusades.

The lyrics of *I'd Rather Have Jesus* speak of choosing Christ over worldly wealth, fame, and success. The opening lines declare:

I'd rather have Jesus than silver or gold, I'd rather be His than have riches untold; I'd rather have Jesus than houses or lands, I'd rather be led by His nail-pierced hand.

These words reflect the biblical thought found in Matthew 16:26, where Jesus asks, "For what profit is it to a man if he gains the whole world, and loses his own soul?" The hymn serves as a reminder that nothing in this world—no amount of wealth, power, or influence—can compare to the surpassing value of knowing Christ. This hymn challenges us to examine our own hearts. Do we truly value Jesus above all else? In a culture that constantly tempts us with material gain and personal success, the words of this song serve as an invitation to realign our priorities. Just as the apostle Paul counted all things as loss for the sake of Christ (Philippians 3:8), we, too, are called to make Christ our greatest treasure.

Singing I'd Rather Have Jesus is more than just singing a beautiful melody—it is a declaration of faith. It is an opportunity to reaffirm our commitment to Christ and to surrender all that we are and have to Him. May we daily choose Jesus over the fleeting pleasures of this world. May our hearts echo the words of this hymn, not just in song, but in the way we live our lives. And may we always remember that in choosing Christ, we gain far more than we could ever lose.




